What is Quality Assurance:

- QA ensures we deliver programs with fidelity, consistency, and impact.
- It involves setting clear expectations, monitoring practice, and providing feedback and support.
- True QA isn't just about measuring it's about strengthening what matters most: relationships, growth, and outcomes.

Why Quality Assurance Matters

• Families deserve the highest-quality services rooted in equity and respect.

• Practitioners deserve support systems that build their skills, not just monitor them.

• QA helps us ensure that every site, every model, and every practitioner can succeed within a shared vision.

• Without QA, we risk inconsistency, drift from our values, and missed opportunities for learning.



Why We Had to Reimagine QA for Equity

- Traditional QA models often emphasized compliance over relationships and learning.
- Assessments and certifications were historically shaped by dominant culture norms.
- Practitioner and family voices revealed a need for tools that reflect identity, strengths, and context.
- Reimagining QA through an equity lens ensures quality is relational, culturally responsive, and communitycentered.

From Voices to Framework

• In 2024, we conducted 13 focus groups across 6 sites in 3 languages.

• Themes from those conversations directly shaped the QA framework.

• Today's activities model the same approach we used to co-develop this work.

Framing the QA Framework

1. Why Change: Context and site variation challenged fidelity models.

2. What the Field Told Us: Qualitative insights from practitioners and families.

3. How We Redesigned: Training, coaching, and tools reimagined.

4. What It Looks Like in Practice: Embedded innovations.

5. The Framework That Ties It Together: Four core QA principles.

Activity 2 Objective: Build the Framework Backwards

- Validate that the QA framework resonates with the field's experiences.
- Demonstrate that the framework reflects real site input.
- Surface areas of overlap between practice and the formal framework.

- Equity as a Foundational Value
- Culturally Responsive Evaluation
- Strength-Based Development
- Ongoing Learning and Adaptation

Where the QA Framework Pillars Come From

- Developed through years of listening to practitioners and site staff across the network.
- Field feedback led to shifts away from PACT and CBT assessments toward culturally responsive tools.
- COVID-era Child Trends study helped introduce the Reflection Record, replacing compliance-focused logs.
- Certification and KEEP were redesigned after concerns over compliance-focus versus practice.
- Each pillar is a response to field-raised tensions, grounded in real experiences and needs.

How QA Pillars Align with Our Core Values

Equity as a Foundational Value →

Race Equity, Commitment to Quality

Culturally Responsive Evaluation →

Family Collaboration, Child-Parent Relationship

Strength-Based Development →

Strength-Based, Reflective Practice

Ongoing Learning and Adaptation →

Lifelong Learning, Adult Learning, Data-Driven

Model Alignment: One Program, Two Models

- Family and HBCC models moving towards being supported by a unified QA framework
- Parallel structures of training and coaching implemented in both models
- Shared principles applied contextually: cultural responsiveness, relational practice, equity
- Use of common QA tools across models (e.g., video, reflections, feedback systems, capacity-building supports)
- Both models now framed by the same four QA pillars, applied with flexibility by context

Key Innovations in the QA Redesign

- Redesigned training structure emphasizing foundational, specialized, and contextual modules
- An Exploration of Hybird Modality. (Child Trends)
- Communities of Practice
- Embedded race equity, social identity, and adult learning theory in PD and coaching
- Introduction of video-based coding (2025: coaching for reflective consultation)
- Shift to strength-based assessment tools: PIEL, PICCOLO, ASQs, FCCERS-R, and CCIS
- Focus groups and Satisfaction Surveys used as QA tools, not just evaluation instruments
- Mixed Methods (Practitioner and Family Voices)
