

Toolkit: Protecting Immigrant Families Facing Deportation

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The Trump administration is expanding the "expedited removal" policy, which permits immigration agents to arrest and deport individuals anywhere in the U.S. without a court hearing. Immigrants should carry copies (not originals) of documents proving they have lived in the U.S. for over two years. A document list can be found on page 7 of this Toolkit.

Help children with family members who are facing deportation

- This tool from the National Immigration Legal Services Directory allows families to search for legal services by zip code.
- The Immigrant Legal Resource Center also has a <u>Know Your Rights Toolkit</u>, including resources for creating a family preparation plan, printable red cards in multiple languages and local resources.
- National Immigrant Justice Center's <u>Know Your Rights</u> resources help families plan to ensure the safety of children and other dependents following the deportation of a parent or caretaker.
- CLINIC has an <u>emergency preparedness web tool</u> with information to assist families in all fifty states. They also have a <u>Rapid Response Toolkit</u> based on best practices from communities conducting rapid responses during ICE raids.
- The National Immigrant Justice Center published an <u>explainer</u> on what mass deportations might look like and includes how to protect yourself and your family.
- Recognizing that deportation and family separation is a major traumatic event in the life of a child, Zero to Three put together <u>these resources</u> for parents, providers, and others involved in protecting children's mental health.
- Appleseed Network created a <u>manual</u> to help immigrants and allies develop plans to deal, such as child custody, in the event of a deportation.
- The Women's Refugee Commission published a <u>series</u> of resources on parental rights, family separation due to immigration, child welfare, and related issues.
- CLASP's webpage contains resources related to immigrant mental health

Share resources for child care and health care providers:

- CLASP's <u>guide</u> on resources for providers on protecting locations from immigration enforcement contains several resources which will be continually updated.

Distribute resources for early childhood and K-12 educators and school districts:

- American Federation of Teachers created <u>these resources</u> for educators to help families at risk of deportation. It includes steps families can take to be prepared.
- CLASP's <u>guide</u> to creating "safe spaces" helps early childhood care providers learn how to set up their facilities they are not subjected to immigration enforcement on their grounds.
